All meetings will run for approx. 30 minutes. Please be on time to ensure all meetings go ahead as planned. Teachers will need to keep to time so if you are going to be late or cannot attend, pelase advise in advance so necessary changes can be made. Thank you for your support.

Thank you to parents and caregivers for your support for our change to bus arrival times. Buses now arrive from 8.45am and students are directed straight to classrooms to begin their day. This change has allowed the school to support additional whole school professional development and allows for all staff to attend our weekly Tuesday staff meetings. Please note that there has been no change to the school hours in terms

Due to the change of bus arrival times it may be necessary to review student pickup times to ensure students are not sitting for long periods of time on their bus waiting to disembark. You may be contacted by your driver with a revised pickup time. Times are negotiated between contractors and drivers and as this is a free service parents are expected to adhere to the guidelines as set out by Assisted School Travel (please contact the office if you have any concerns). Our primary concern is ensuring students are not kept waiting on transport for extended periods of time which can impact significantly on behaviour and attention to tasks within their educational program.

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Class Gardener

The year has started quickly for class Gardener by settling into their new routines and getting to know their classmates.

We are currently looking at ways to be more positive members of the local and global community. We have begun learning about recycling products, how our lifestyles impact our world and the things we consume every day.

Hawthorne's class are participating in an integrated unit on Fish and the Sea. The related text is Where the Forest Meets the Sea by Jeannie Baker. Students have participated in making an artificial reef, dramatising the visual text and cooking an array of seafood including calamari and fish. Students explored how Indigenous Australians can catch and cook fish and seafood in a variety of ways including with their hands, handmade fish nets and spears.











Class Suarez

Welcome to term 1, 2016. The staff and students in our class are looking forward to an enjoyable, hardworking and rewarding year. The following is an outline of what is happening this term.









Literacy sessions are based around guided reading, writing, spelling and comprehension. Maths focus will be on time, number and money. Units from History and Geography are being introduced this year.

We are also looking forward to more exciting activities this year such as cooking program, aqua & dance zumba, healthy canteen, integration program and travel training with the senior students using Opal card.

The integrated unit of work for this term looks at environments. Lessons cover literacy, maths, music, PE, history and geography, science, art and craft. North Sydney Intellectual Disability Health Team Funded by the Northern Sydney Local Health District

Do you have a child (up to 13 years old) with an intellectual disability? Are you feeling overwhelmed and under stress?



Northern Intellectual Disability Health and the University of Technology Sydney are inviting parents with a child with an intellectual disability, who are experiencing stress to attend one of two different 8-week support groups. Come along to:

- Examine ways of overcoming stress
- Develop skills and implement strategies to reduce stress and its impact on the family
- Improve the well-being of yourself and your family

The groups will be run at Northern Intellectual Disability Health in Cremorne by provisionally registered Psychologists under supervision. There is no cost for attending this group. Groups will be evaluated by questionnaires completed by participants online weekly, and at the beginning and end of the study.


Get Ready for Study and Work Forum


