Thank you to the P&C for their outstanding donation of the wonderful musical instruments that now compliment the sensory garden. Thank you to Pauline and the P&C for the ongoing maintenance of the sensory garden, with the replenishment of bark and fixing the watering system.

This term has seen Peter Dawes from Centennial Parklands continuing the replanting of our school garden, with all students, thereby providing students with realistic learning opportunities in Science/Sustainability.

The PECs workshop (Picture Exchange System) workshop was well received by parents who attended the Pyramid training. Parents subsequently requested workshops on Auslan, which will be scheduled and run by the school Auslan Learning Support Officer.

Shining Stars has commenced and is currently supported by Miss

Carroll (R/AP) and Miss Baxter (SLSO). This program is funded by the Citizens Committee. Their first performance is on 20th June in the Spotlight Dance Festival, a statewide public school dance festival. Their next performance is at the Shining Stars expo in October.

Reverse integration with Revesby Public school has commenced. Miss Kirkham (AP) and Miss Fox (SLSO) host 8 students BGS and Mr Dibley from Revesby Public School Support unit Supports 8 students. Together they are working on an Apple Classroom Literacy session using the Tell Me program.

The school has purchased much needed new Change Tables (4) at the cost of \$11,000. They will be arriving this term.

The school will be funding the new School Counsellor office at the cost of \$9917 to make the current School Counsellor office available as a Deputy Principal office and a much needed meeting room.

We celebrate Jan Barretts' (R/AP) invitation from Sydney University to speak on 'Every child has the right to an education' Teacher Panel, sharing the platform with Eddie Woo.

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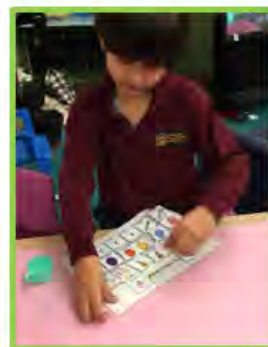
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Butterfly Class

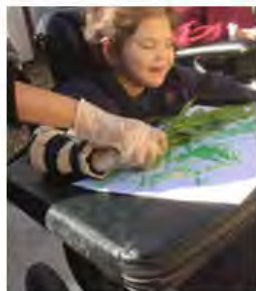




Dragonfly Class

Dalmatian Class

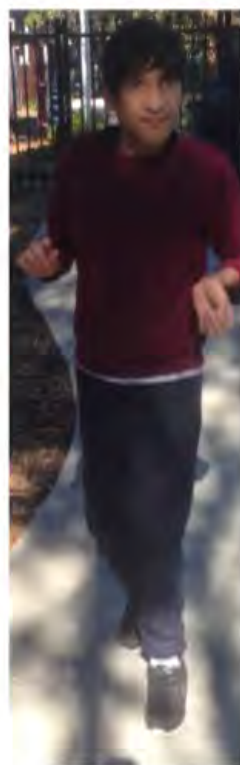

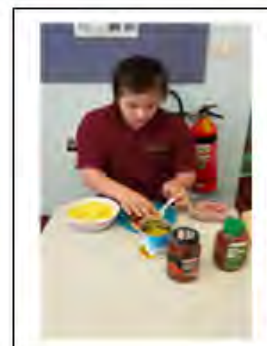
Class Deer

Our school focusses on fostering independent thinking skills in the classroom. This semester, class Akuete (Macaw) has been participating in our cooking program. Students observe and participate in various skills required for food preparation. Each student participates in making pizza with muffin, ham, cheese and pineapple. The pizza is placed in the oven and baked for 15 to 20 minutes or until cheese has melted and bases are crisp. The students enjoy eating the pizza after the preparation.

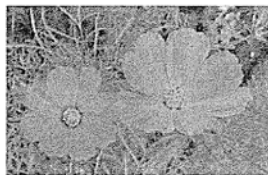
**TOP 5 THINGS TO DO WHILE YOU ARE HERE:**

THE AUSTRALIAN PLANTBANK

EARLY YEARS BUSH CONNECTIONS

COURSE CODE: 25220W

Early Years Bush Connections is delivered in partnership with Centennial Parklands in Sydney. It is an Australian first as it is currently the only recognised qualification (Statement of Attainment) for educators who wish to use the Australian bush and beach as their learning spaces.

The objectives of this training is to develop skills in the following areas:

- Understanding the importance of the natural world for children
- Developing knowledge and understandings of the Australian bush and beach and the Indigenous values towards the land
- Developing learning programs to promote children's connections with the Australian Bush
- Connecting children, families and the community with nature

This Statement of Attainment has staggered enrolment throughout the year.

The course curriculum and Learner Resource for Early Years Bush Connections will be offered as a standalone program to Early Childhood Education and Care enterprises, existing workers in Early Childhood settings, TAFE students and environmental educators who wish to learn about the skills, knowledge and attitudes to connect children to nature.

The course builds on current international best practice in Early Childhood Education and Care, research from Scandinavia, European and British nature education and forest schools programs on the benefits and values of nature education as well as emerging research and case studies from Australia.

Participants will attend a program of both indoor and outdoor learning sessions where they will cover content such as:

- Risk benefit in the outdoors
- how to manage children in an outdoor setting
- Planning and programming for the outdoors



- Flora and fauna of the Australian bush
- Principles of nature education and outdoor learning

Our Trainers are subject matter experts in the field of Early Childhood Education and care, they hold Certificate IV in Training and Assessment and they have received internationally recognised Forest School training.

A place to call home

A healthy woodland ecosystem has many layers, from the tree canopy down to the grassy understorey, and supports an amazing diversity of plant and animal life – our local biodiversity!

The backbone of the woodland are our three main eucalypt species. The dark one with very rough bark is the Narrow-leaved Ironbark (*Eucalyptus crebra*). The smooth streaky barked gum is the Forest Red Gum (*Eucalyptus tereticornis*) and the fibrous grey barked one with smooth upper branches is the Grey Box (*Eucalyptus moluccana*).

But plants aren't the only species to call the Woodland home and our native fauna residents are all around you. Keep an eye out for wallaroos feeding or reclining amongst the scrub and grasslands. The elusive swamp wallaby can sometimes be heard thumping through the understorey, while the bearded dragon is a frequent warm weather sight reclining on rocks.

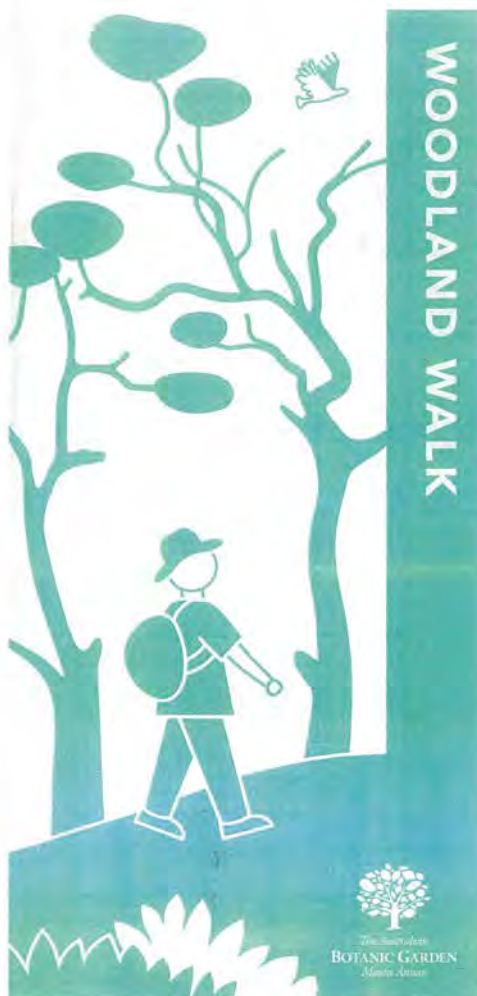
Year round the air is filled with the calls of many birds and on most days visitors will hear the Superb Fairy-wren and the Sulphur Crested Cockatoo. A feature resident is the endangered Cumberland land snail who spend their days sheltering under leaf litter or logs, or buried under loose soil eating fungi.

We can all play a part in conserving this precious bushland – so why not get involved with your local bushcare group and do your bit for the local environment?

Why is Cumberland Plain Woodland so important?

A vital habitat for native birds, animals and plants, this endangered bushland is unique to western Sydney and is under direct threat from urban growth. Once thought of by many as unsightly scrub, this bushland is now being recognised for what it is – a unique type of woodland not found anywhere else in Australia, which is rare and threatened with extinction.

Heavily cleared in the past for farming, it is still being cleared today to accommodate much of Sydney's population growth. With less than 9% of the original Cumberland Plain Woodland remaining, it is now listed as a Critically Endangered Ecological Community. But even with laws to protect the Woodland, it is still under threat, and in many places, being badly affected by weeds, fertiliser run-off and rubbish.

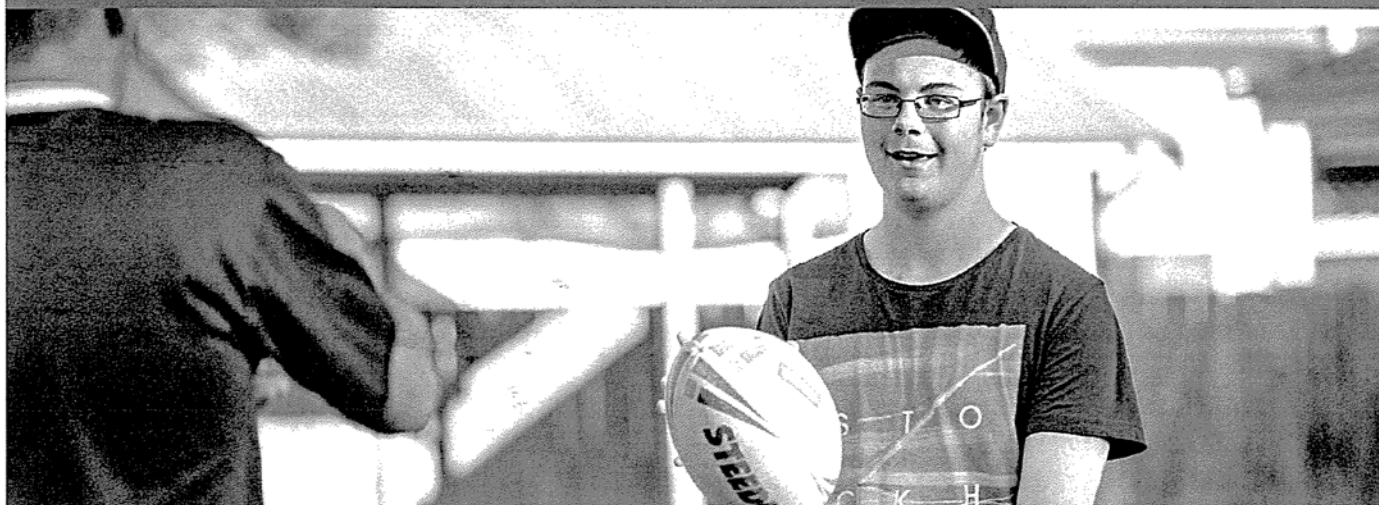

Our staff ratio is 1:1 or 1:2 and children are grouped according to common abilities and interests. We also focus on building your child's skills at age-appropriate levels.

Safety and security matter, which is why we carry out risk assessments each time your child visits. Our grounds are fully gated to allow children the freedom to explore safely.

Belfield House is easily accessible and we can arrange for one of our professionally converted accessible vehicles to come to you.

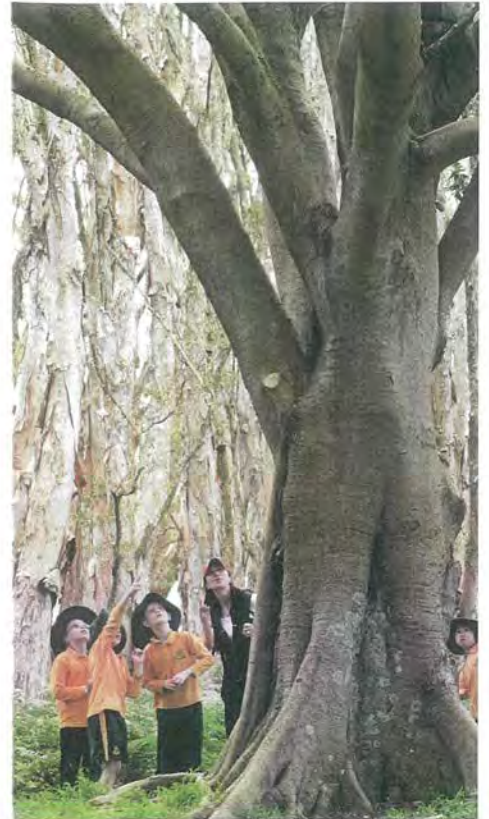

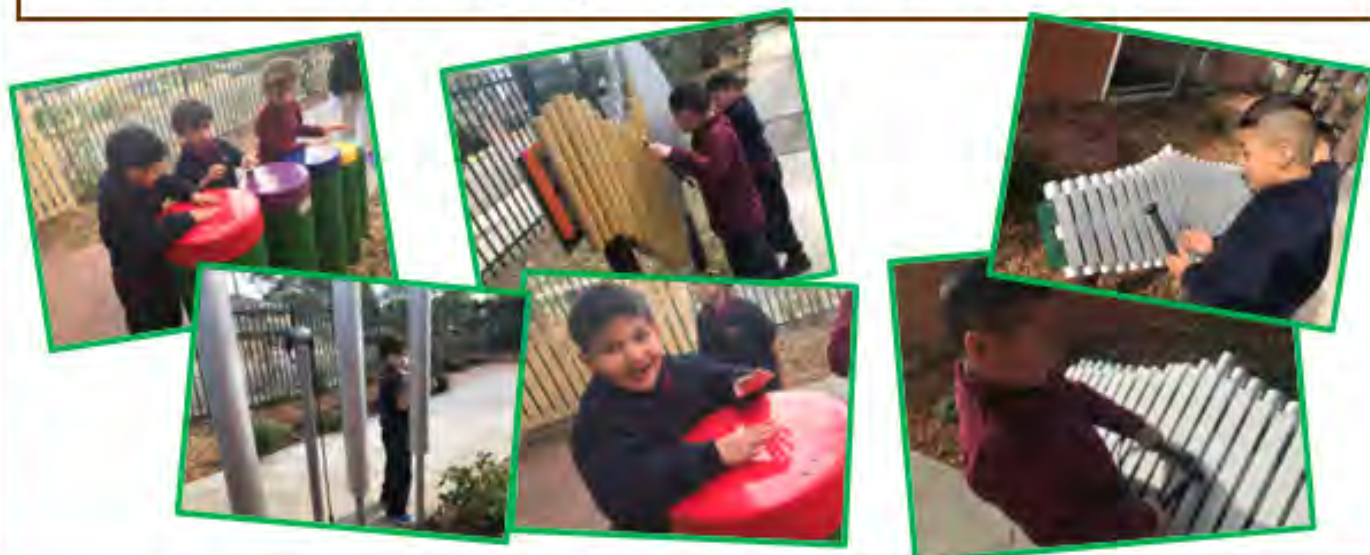
