NEW KINDERGARTEN STUDENTS

BGS has welcomed nine Kindergarten students this year, who have had a great start to their first year of school. During their transition they enjoyed a variety of developmental play and gross motor activities. Students completed lessons focusing on the picture book "The Very Hungry Caterpillar" including literacy, numeracy and creative art activities. Students made playdough caterpillars and explored different colours to make beautiful painted butterflies. The kindy's have been split into Class Parke and Class De-Bourbon and are settling into their classroom and the school routine well. All Kindergarten students participated in Best Start Kindergarten assessments during weeks 3 and 4, the Best Start Kindergarten Assessment identifies students' literacy and numeracy skills on entry to Kindergarten and is mapped to the National Literacy and Numeracy Learning Progressions. It provides teachers with information to plan for teaching and learning to meet the individual needs of students. We are looking forward to an exciting year ahead.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENTS

Over the holiday period, our school grounds were subject to a bit of a face lift! From new painting of walls, poles, hallways and classrooms - the school is almost unrecognisable in our A block! On top of the new paint work, all skylights around the school that were damaged have been fixed, a new filter has been placed in our pool and new air conditioning units have been placed in our demountable classrooms. The BGS sensory den has been re-installed professionally in B Block to accommodate the sensory needs of our students and is also utilised as a cool new play space for our junior school during inside weather duties. New decking has been placed outside the demountables which has extended our outdoor learning spaces and have been funded from a successful grant submission, the Australian Government's Local Schools Community Grant. BGS extends a very big thank you to David Coleman MP and his office. In the driveway you may also notice our new pedestrian walkway which has been marked with yellow zebra crossing strips. This path provides a safe walkway and will encourage our students to continue walking safely across all environments and for our community to use when entering the school as a pedestrian. We are also happy to announce that the school improvements haven't stopped just yet. We are very excited that soon we will see a new library installed in the C Block Prac area, new notice boards set up in the A Block corridor which will be adorned with our students' works and photos for all our visitors to delight in and new umbrellas installed in the sensory garden. Watch this space for all these updates and more in the coming weeks. A big thank you to Luke and his team, the DoE contracted painters and of course BGS' very own amazing GA, Adrian, who has been working around the clock to accommodate these scheduled works making our school a great place to be!













Principal's message

Welcome back to all our students, staff, families and community. It has been wonderful to welcome all our new students and their families to the BGS community. This year to date BGS has seen the enrolment of 16 new students, nine of which are starting their education journey, at big school.

The school started back at the beginning of the year with all staff updating in mandatory training on the first day back, including CPR and Anaphylaxis and Mandated Child Protection updates which is vital to all our students' wellbeing. The staff also completed professional learning in the DoE Code of Conduct and Corruption and Prevention training.

I would like to acknowledge the work of Lydia who is not only one of our Kindergarten teachers but who has also taken up higher duties and is currently an Assistant Principal, relieving for term 1 and is doing a stellar job, thank you Lydia.

Last year at the last Parent Café for 2019, parents suggested for the school to provide a way that parents who are unable to attend the Parent Café could still have a voice at the school. This has been done and the school has now set up a suggestion platform, which resembles a 'suggestion box' on the Skoolbag app. Information on how to access this has been included in the attachment at the back of this newsletter and will also be sent home to all parents through a push notification on Skoolbag. The school looks forward to getting positive feedback and suggestions and where we are able to meet the needs of our wider community. I would like to note that this is a suggestion platform to make the school greater and not a place to raise your personal concerns. I ask that all personal concerns continue to be raised via the appropriate channels. As you can appreciate, it is often difficult to address concerns if they do not have names attached to them and if they are something that are more personal and individual student/family related. The suggestion platform on Skoolbag can be used for the greater good of school improvement for the whole school. Families, if you have personal concerns that need to be addressed, please work with your child's class teacher or contact me directly to discuss these matters that you may require support with. This allows my staff and myself to target the attention and also supports privacy and dignity of the situation and your concern raised.

Also at this meeting the parents noted that at times when exiting the school they have to reach through and push the bell, which is at times difficult, to remind the office staff that they are at the gate and ready to exit. Unfortunately, sometimes from the time it takes our parents to get to the gate, they may stop and chat with someone or even if they go straight to the gate the office has had many things occur and their attention is diverted. To support this, a suggestion of a bell on the inside was provided. The school has now put a bell on the inside of the gate to support families exiting the school and there are written instructions above this on how to use this bell. All of these suggestions that come from the Parent Café are listened to and where applicable are actioned. If the school is unable to action the Parent Café minutes are responded to for the next meeting and I outline the reasoning and seek an alternative process or suggestion. I would like to thank Jo Freeman, parent, for taking on the Chairperson role at these Café's and also extend my thanks to the parents able to attend and for their support in making our school the best it can be. The Parent Cafés are held on a Tuesday in week 3 of each term, the parents meet first and then attend the student run Zen Zone Café for coffee and treats. All parents are welcome and interpreters can be provided if requested.

I am very excited to advise our community that BGS has undertaken two trials to support best practice in our school. BGS was successful through an Expression of Interest for **Devices for Teachers – PILOT**. We have been invited to participate in an exciting pilot program that will deliver a mobile computer device, to be allocated to each teacher. This pilot is an important step towards:

Confirming if the allocation of a device to teachers has a positive impact on learning outcomes of students, streamlining administration and planning processes, the effective use of technology during teaching and learning opportunities.

To have success in this pilot teachers will thoroughly utilise their devices regularly in their day to day practice, participate in our professional learning sessions, and provide us feedback throughout the pilot. BGS has now streamlined programming and all documentation in One Note on each device and each teacher has their own One Note class profile.

A total of 21 devices will be allocated to Broderick Gillawarna School.

Each school participating in this pilot will be provided with the same brand/model of device to be allocated to each teacher. This will assist your teachers to work collaboratively on a common technology platform, and help develop your school's plans for how the devices can/will be used in the classroom. Teachers can choose to take their device home each day.

How will the pilot work?

The pilot has been designed in 3 Phases, to ensure that we effectively test the concept of allocating a device per teacher, and provide effective support to all the pilot participants.

The Phases are as follows:

Phase 1 - Selection and Delivery of devices to participants

Phase 2 – Getting to know your device – tips, tricks and general device orientation.

Phase 3 – Getting the best out of your device in the teaching and learning space.

BGS has moved into phase 2 and entering phase 3

The other trial is the **Assessment for Complex Learning Trial**.

BGS expressed an interest to be part of the Assessment for Complex Learners Trial. It has been confirmed that BGS was nominally accepted to be part of the trial.

The research project aims to trial innovative learning assessment approaches for students with intellectual disability/autism. The trial is seeking the schools support, expertise and commitment to collaborate on this research to find how to best support complex learners. Jacqui, BGS, Deputy Principal is leading both these exciting trials and we are looking forward to some amazing results.

I would like to remind our families and community of BGS School Plan. School Plan 2018 -2020.

2020 is the last year of the school plan. In 2021 we will be moving into a new 3-year planning cycle. Each project team will meet to review/set/and meet milestones across 2020. The strategic plan 2018-2020 has 6 project areas including:

- TEACCH with a focus on numeracy (SD 1)
- Communication systems with a focus on PECS and literacy (SD 1)
- PBL with a focus on student wellbeing (SD 1)
- Compliance this has now been renamed from NESA Compliance to Department and NESA requirements (SD 2)
- Systems with a focus on school operations including external provider processes, HCP processes etc (SD 2 and 3)
- Community Connections with a focus on community communication/involvement and school operational systems (SD 3)

All project teams are working hard and were successful with their 2019 milestones. They are meeting and looking at budget and forward planning for the last year of this planning cycle. The school will soon publish its Annual School Report which will demonstrate our successes across 2019 in these areas.

I would like to thank all our families for recently attending your child's Personalised Learning Plan (PLP) meetings. These meetings are vital to your child's learning and this collaboration of Specifiic, Measureable, Attainable, Reportable, Timebound (S.M.A.R.T) goals are negotiated for your child highlights the importance of our families as our partners in their learning. Our teachers will soon return the PLP documents completed for your signature. Can you please read through these docuements and sign and return so we can begin with the agreed upon goals with your children. I would also like to thank those families who were very supportive and followed up on much needed health care paper work to have your child safely attending school. Please note that without this paperwork up to date we will need to assess your child's safety at school. As a priority please follow your child's teachers request and get all updated emergency and management plans and send these to the school. Also the medication request forms must be completed when you send in your child's medication. Without this correctly filled document we will have to call you to attend to administer medication until the documentation is completed. Thank you for your support in these matters.

This year the raising and drawing down of our three flags at the school will be done by Class Daughton and Class Christensan in our senior school, led by Renaye and Simone and Jake and Cass B. I would like to extend my thanks to Wendy who always supported our students in this process and Wendy has happily supported the new staff and students in correct procedures and how to operate the new flag poles. I hope you enjoy our three prominent flags as you enter the school grounds next time flying proudly.










Class Christenson








Class McNaughton




