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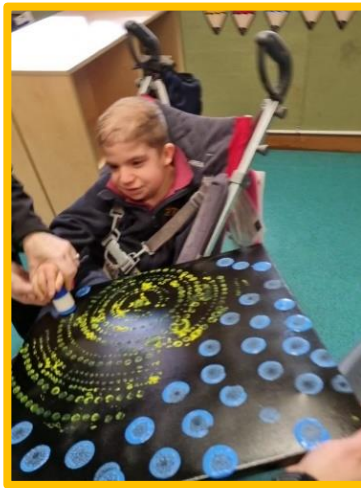


Reconciliation Week



BGS students participated in a range of activities to recognise National Reconciliation Week – with this year's theme being "More than a word. Reconciliation takes action". A Virtual Reality (VR) incursion included a series of interactive experiences through dedicated headsets. Students explored the Far North Queensland rainforest with The Pamagirri Aboriginal group, engaged in interactive educational games about bush tucker and hunting, and watched a CGI video about the Dreamtime. Staff were thoroughly impressed with the level of engagement students demonstrated with this experience. Some students completed hands-on activities such as painting on canvases inspired by our newly acquired beautiful artwork in the front playground. They applied paints to a template and completed a similar dot pattern. The canvases will be displayed in A Block, along with a recently displayed whole school artwork. The students watched videos exploring dance, music and 'bush tucker', and many joined in with the movements and danced along. It proved a fun and engaging way to learn about First Nations culture, beliefs, and the importance of reconciliation to our nation.

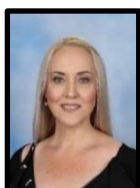

News from the classroom

Class Akuete

The students at BGS participated in celebrating Reconciliation Week 2021. The theme of Reconciliation Week was "More than a word. Reconciliation takes action". Class Akuete students participated in lots of exciting activities to mark this week. During class, the students explored the Aboriginal Indigenous cultures that were passed down through generations by looking at their music, artwork and storytelling. They listened to a variety of Aboriginal dreamtime stories such as 'How the Kangaroo Got Her Pouch' and 'Rainbow Serpent'.

Additionally, Class Akuete students had the opportunity to participate in a Virtual Reality (VR) incursion on Wednesday, 2nd of June. The students were supported to engage with a series of interactive experiences through virtual reality headsets. These included: exploring the Far North Queensland rainforest with The Pamagirri Aboriginal group in a full 360-degree view, engaging in interactive educational games about bush tucker hunting and a CGI video about the Dreamtime. The program involved the use of a VR headset. The hands-on activities that were provided by the incursion educator engaged the students and allowed them to make connections to what they have learned during history lessons about the Aboriginal people.

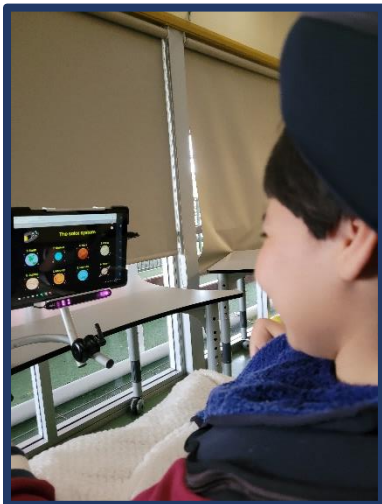

Class Do

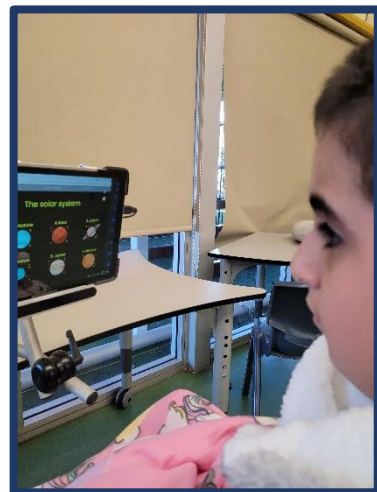

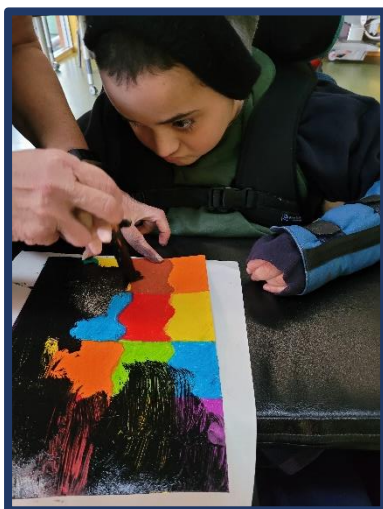

One by one they throw the ball underarm or overarm. Each practice session, the students are gaining better control over the ball and throwing closer to the 'jack ball'.

Olivia for being a learner as she practises her learnt skills across environments and Aboudi for being safe as he remains with the group during transitions.

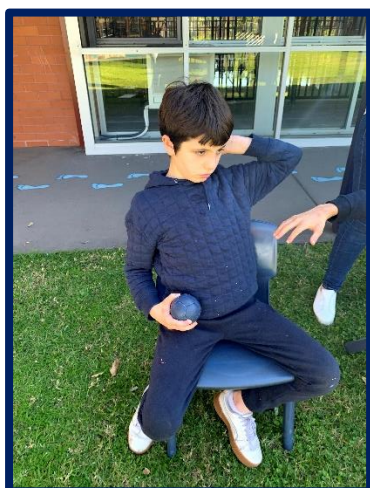

Class Gill

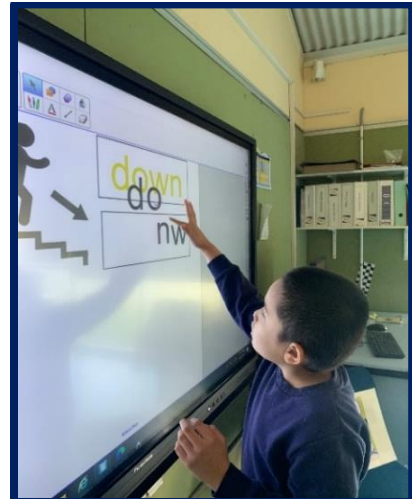

Class Russell

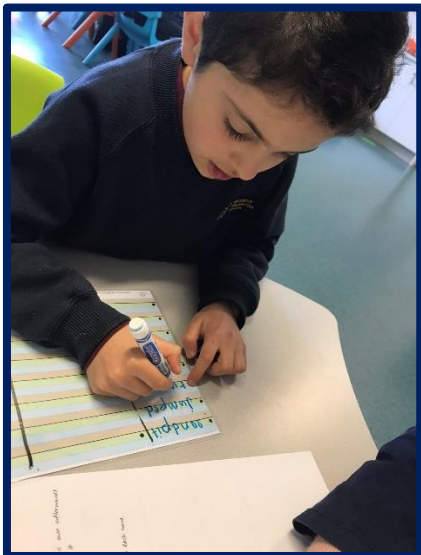

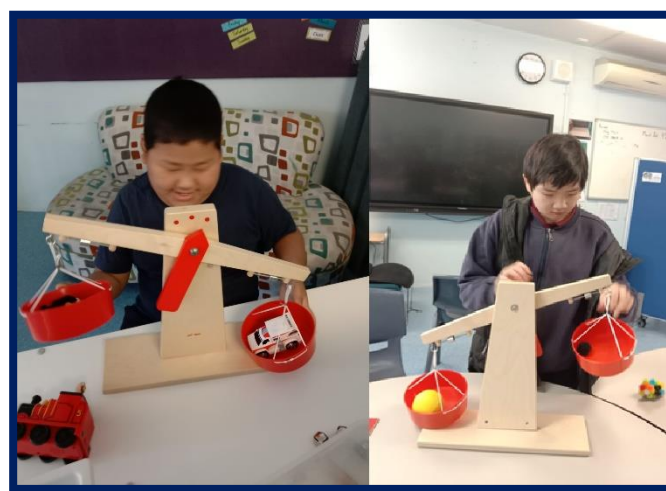
Class Rheinberger

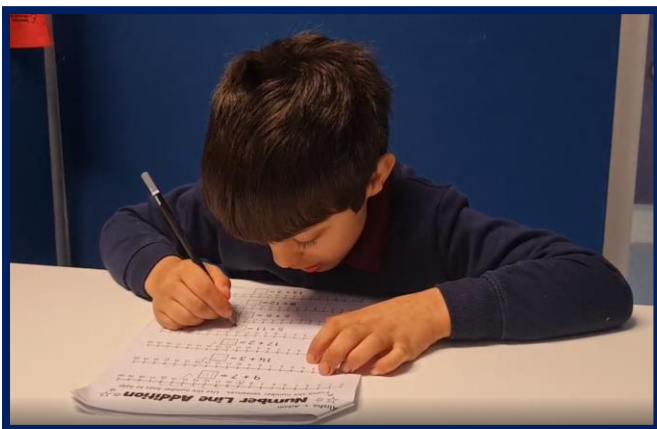

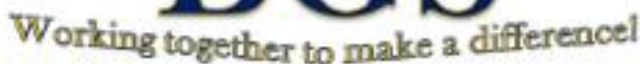
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Seeking expressions of interest for new Vacation Care service in Revesby

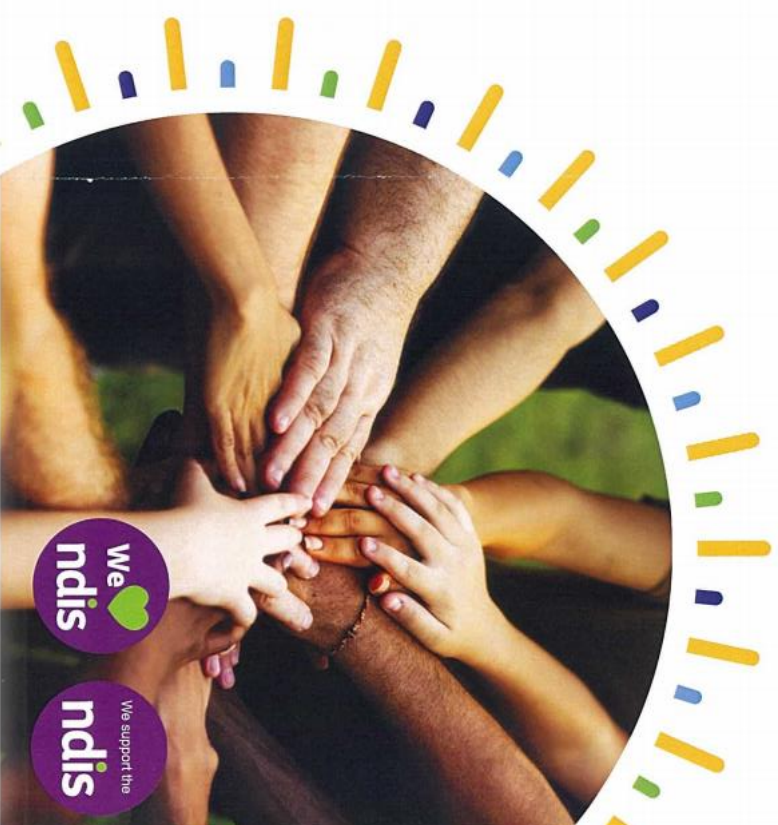
