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## **Remembrance Day**

Remembrance Day was first observed in 1919 throughout the British Commonwealth. It was originally called "Armistice Day" to commemorate Armistice agreement that ended the First World War on Monday, November 11, 1918 at 11 a.m.—on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. This commemoration gives people the chance to remember those who fought and lost their lives during the war and honour their memory. It makes sure that we never forget the past, and that those who died didn't die in vain.

At BGS, Remembrance Day was observed by lowering the school flags to half-mast as a mark of respect and students and staff paused to remember all those who bravely gave their lives to allow us to live in peace. Each class prepared a wreath and poppy to be laid. Due to Covid restrictions, classes engaged in the ceremony via Teams in their classrooms.


As a leader in the food service industry, everything that Bakers Maison does as a company is guided by their unwavering, companywide commitment to impacting our environment as little as possible with our operations.


## Year 12 Formal

What an incredible group of students we have here at Broderick Gillawarna School, they have succeeded against the backdrop of the pandemic. I have to tell you all that I am humbled, massively proud, delighted and most of all extremely impressed by their collective achievements.

If you told me life would become virtual a few years back, I would not have believed it. It is definitely a different way of participating in life.

This year we farewell five-year 12 graduating students, Ethan, Ricky, Danny, Ahmed and Teja. It was such a privilege to bear witness to how these fine young men have grown in confidence, knowledge and kindness and we hope that we have laid the foundations to them becoming active citizens. Each of the young men have grown in a way that they should be so very proud of. You are now ready to transition to the next exciting chapter in your lives, starting post school options. This year especially, we have watched in awe at how you have shown resilience and courage. You have shown independence and maturity in how you engaged with remote learning. We can reflect on the past year and be comforted in the knowledge, that while it was tough, it was character building and you boys really stood up to the challenge, Well done! The boys celebrated with their formal and with dancing permitted, we will hit the dance floor in true celebration style!

A big shout out to all our year 6 graduates as they move to high school next year. Aaliyah, Anthony, Hamoudi, Lachlan, Adam, Bradley, Alisha, Olivia and Farah. Congratulations Year 6 on officially graduating from your primary school years. It doesn't seem that long ago when you first commenced your journey, you have all grown in so many ways. We have felt privileged to share your years of primary school with you and you are thanked for your commitment to your learning. We look forward to you continuing your high school journey with us and continuing to grow into outstanding young men and women.

I would like to acknowledge all the wonderful achievements of all our students and their overall outstanding personalised learning goal. To rise up and achieve is nothing less than wonderful and definitely worth the celebrations.

This year we had a lot put on hold, but we are slowly moving forward. As you were aware we were successful with the Metro Renewal program whereby the Department of Education matched dollar for dollar for a project at the school looking at infrastructure. The school is endeavouring to have a new covered outdoor learning area installed over our existing basketball court and I am excited and happy to report that construction is starting on Friday December 17<sup>th</sup>. It is believed to take 12 weeks to install but hopefully by late February next year all going to plan, we will have this structure up and supporting our students for outdoor play and learning.

Revesby workers generously donated \$16,560 and Bankstown Sports Club kindly donated \$5560.00 through the Clubs Grants NSW. These wonderful contributions to our school supported a Green Heroes project. The Green Heroes project, led by teachers, Salome Suarez, Rekha Nanda and Rebecca Finn created a sustainable garden for our students' hands on learning. The project will provide opportunities for learning outside of the classroom and will enable students with complex disabilities make connections to apply their learning to the real world. The project aims to increase awareness of healthy eating and a sense of pride while the students harvest their own vegetables and care for the school environment. This area is now ready for planting, getting our hands dirty and learning through, science and food technology programs.

This year our very own Citizens Committee provided us with an extremely generous donation of \$24,210 for performing arts programs. School Spectacular and Shining Stars are both programs that BGS students enter and perform in. Unfortunately, both programs were cancelled due to COVID but with any luck they will come back with force in 2022 and we will utilise the kind donation of the Citizen Committee in 2022 for BGS to star in both events.

We also installed 8 new interactive white boards in the amount of \$28,286 for our students learning. An interactive smart board, also known as an electronic whiteboard, is a classroom tool that allows images from a computer screen to be displayed on a larger board and both the teacher and student can interact with the images directly on the screen using a tool or even a finger. This board is a significant teaching tool in all our classrooms.

This year we started a new four-year School Improvement Plan, 2021-2024.

Our school vision is;

# 'To optimise the strengths of every student and their extended support team to enhance academic achievement and social and emotional development. At our core, is a focus on the whole student, a positive learning environment, high expectations, collaboration and inclusive practice to promote best quality life outcomes'.

This vision is what cements us as a community and partnerships in learning.

Despite the difficult year, we achieved all our milestones for this year in our school plan. We implemented a new wellbeing suite including Smiling Minds, Trauma informed practice, Zones of Regulation, Sensory Processing and Trauma sensitive restorative yoga all of which saw a dramatic shift in behaviours of our students and had them ready to engage with their learning and access their curriculum at a positive baseline. Two staff became smiling minds champions and have been rolling out this vital mindfulness program across the school.

Mac Lit and Initial Lit training for two staff took place who then trained all staff and has risen the literacy achievements of our students. Literacy and Numeracy assessments were created in number identification and phonological awareness which will be trialed in 2022.

Two staff became trained facilitators in the Stepping Stones Positive Parent Partnerships and look forward to working with our families with this program in 2022.

Data Literacy was explored, and a new system of practice has been adopted to make mapping and tracking assessment of our students more uniformed and user friendly for reporting and personalised learning data to be collected and evaluated. It is exciting to watch the developments and school improvements and we look forward to building on what we have already achieved in 2021.

I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and congratulate Johnson Do, Bhupinder Gill and Marc Herzen who were all successful through merit and are now substantiative teachers at BGS.

I would like to recognise and farewell some of our 2021 temporary staff who will be moving on next year. A very big thank you to Daniel Wright, Kelda Rheinberger, Amber Russell, Ash Randhay and Mira Saad. Your support and professionalism were second to none and we thank you for your time and service to our students and school and wish you well on your next endeavours.

I would like to thank our teaching and support staff for their professionalism and dedication to their roles in the school. It is this dedication that provides for the opportunities and successes of our students. I would like to thank the administrative and support staff who work in the background to support the operation of the school and our teachers in delivering their learning programs. I would like to acknowledge our teachers and SLSOs who brought their enthusiasm and knowledge to the classroom, promoting excellence and supporting our students to improve results.

Thank you to our executive team Jacqueline Hamilton Deputy Principal and Assistant Principals Frances De-Bourbon, Alison Kell, Jake Christenson, Cassandra Cutuli and recently relieving Rebecca Finn and Thy Ngyuen. Your leadership in support of student programs ensures that we will continue to be a school meeting the needs of our learners through this continually changing educational landscape.

A very big thank you to our School Council, P&C and Citizen Committee for your ongoing commitment and support.

Parents and Families thank you for your support and partnership in the education of your children. You were thrown in the deep with home learning this year, we had a dress rehearsal in 2020 but this year you took it in your stride and supported the public health order. This was not easy, but you all worked so closely with our teachers to benefit your child and for this I am very thankful. I have valued your support as we have built a supporting and nurturing school community. I look forward to continuing to foster our relationships and a great 2022 school year.

Finally, to our students. Congratulations on your achievements this year. We have a school of passionate, engaged and enthusiastic young people who excel and display their talents in so many different ways. It has been wonderful to see the confidence and pride grow in each of you over the last year.

I believe that together we have developed a school community that caters to the needs and interests of our students. A school community that believes in itself and all of the wonderful things our students can achieve. A school community that does not put barriers or excuses in the way, but that works hard and values our students and what they can achieve.

In closing and most importantly, lets reflect on the year that was and all our achievements. 

It has been an absolute pleasure and honour to work with these young men and watch their transition into adulthood. We have learnt as much about resilience and hard work from you as you have learnt from us.



Dear Parent or Carer

As announced by the Minister, from 8 November all NSW schools will move to updated Level 3 settings that bring school operations more in line with what is allowed in the community. I would like to update you on the key changes that will be in place at our school from Monday 8 November and for the rest of Term 4.

#### Keeping us all safe on school grounds

A combination of layered COVID-safe plans and measures will allow us to prioritise student and staff safety and keep our school open. To do this, the following guidelines will be in place:

- Students, staff and visitors must not attend school if unwell, even with mild symptoms.
- All staff and adult visitors on the school site must be fully vaccinated and provide proof of vaccination.
- Masks are required indoors for all staff, adult visitors and students in Year 7 or above, and strongly
  recommended indoors for primary students. People with a disability are exempt to wearing a mask.
  Masks can be removed when eating or exercising.
- All staff and visitors must check in when attending a school site or gathering.
- Adults should maintain 1.5 metres physical distancing wherever practicable.
- Activities and events should be held outdoors where practical.
- Indoor spaces will be well ventilated and as large as possible for the number of attendees following square metre guidelines.
- Students should avoid mingling with other class and year groups when moving around the school.
- Students and staff will maintain good hand hygiene and schools will continue with enhanced cleaning, including high touch points.

#### From 8 November

Our school will operate on updated Level 3 settings for the rest of Term 4 2021, with the following activities allowed in a COVID-safe manner:

- Assemblies and presentations are allowed outdoors, with cohorts separated and physical distancing in place. Fully vaccinated visitors (including parents and carers) are only allowed to attend if completing a specific role (such as presenting) and at the invitation of the school.
- Community use is allowed outside of school hours (including P&C meetings) with COVID-safe plans in place – in line with public health requirements.
- Dancing, bands, ensembles and music classes will be allowed within cohorts. However, everyone
  must wear masks while playing instruments indoors. Other instruments that rely on breath or require
  a mask to be removed to be played, as well as singing and chanting, are not permitted in Term 4.

- Excursions are allowed outdoors (and indoors where sole use of the premises is available).
- Incursions are allowed indoors and outdoors where cohorts are kept separate.
- Graduations and formals are allowed within cohorts, either on school sites or at external venues with COVID-safe plans in place and physical distancing adhered to.
- School sports are allowed, including inter-school sports and access to indoor and outdoor pools (from 1 November).
- Transitions and orientations are allowed in a COVID-safe way that minimises mingling between students.

#### Parents and carers on site to support school operations

Fully vaccinated parents and carers will be allowed on-site to support curriculum delivery, student wellbeing activities and school operations (for example reading support, canteens and uniform shops). Parents and carers must check in using the school check-in and show proof of vaccination on entry to the school site.




