

National Science Week - BGS Science Fair







This year the theme for National Science Week was 'Glass: More Than Meets the Eye', and students learned about how glass and other similar materials such as perspex are used in everyday items and equipment including magnifying glasses and binoculars, mirrors, terrariums, and toys such as marbles and kaleidoscopes. At the BGS science fair, students explored symmetry and reflections with mirror books, and made their own kaleidoscopes through repurposing cardboard tubes. Each class participated in making their own terrarium and learned about how these mini greenhouses meet the needs of a plant by recycling transpired water. The marble run exhibit was a big hit and students explored gravity and manipulating the marble's path when they took turns placing marbles in the chute then watching them roll down. The school collection of mini beasts in resin where on display and students safely examined a range of creepy crawlies including tarantulas and scorpions with magnifying glasses. There was also a beach and a space backdrop complete with comets and spaceships to be explored by the students' using binoculars. Since the fair, many classes have used the resources provided in their show bag in classrooms to extend their learning and experimentation.

BGS students in Kindergarten to Year 10 recently celebrated National Science Week by attending the 'Kaleidoscope Big Science Show'. The show explored aspects of the physical world science strand with practical and exciting demonstrations. Educator Mitchell kept the students entertained and engaged while they learned about everyday examples of scientific phenomena. For example they learned about simple machines when a student flexed their muscles and used a lever to lift up a peer and even a teacher, and other student volunteers used centripetal force to keep water in a bucket as it was swung upside down. The kids in the front rows were relieved they didn't get wet! Mitchell also demonstrated some mind-bending push and pull forces, cantilevers and balanced some unlikely objects. A lot of fun was had by all and thank you to Mitchell for visiting and showing the students such engaging examples of forces in action.



Principal's message

Just like that Term three is done! I hope all our families who have been able to attend our events this term have enjoyed them and most importantly been very proud of your children and their efforts.

I would like to take this opportunity to send out a special thank you to our Citizen Committee for their very kind donation which has enabled us to hire a music teacher for Terms three and four. Marnie joins our team with a wealth of knowledge and talent as a trained music teacher and already has won the hearts and minds of our students. They are so engaged in her lessons it is nothing short of impressive. It really is as the saying goes 'music is life itself'.

A few weeks ago, I mentioned the Inclusive Engaging and Respectful School Package. I would like to provide more information on this. The Inclusive, Engaging and Respectful (IER) Schools package was announced in February this year by NSW Minister for Education and Early Learning, Hon Sarah Mitchell.

It centres on three new policies and procedures and a framework that together set the guidelines for how we ensure all children and young people can learn through public education in a safe and engaging way. The IER Schools package includes the:

- Inclusive Education Policy for students with disability
- Student Behaviour Policy and Procedures
- Restrictive Practices Framework and Restrictive Practices Reduction and Elimination Policy and Procedures.

With these new policies, we want all students to:

- be included in all aspects of school life and supported to learn to their fullest capability
- be supported in engaging, respectful, and effective classrooms with positive and inclusive practices
- · feel welcomed, valued, and safe in our schools and classroom

Two of the policies are new: the Inclusive Education Policy; and the Restrictive Practices Framework and policy. Both clarify existing legal obligations, effective, appropriate, and prohibited practices, and the rights of students, parents, and carers.

The Student Behaviour Policy replaces the Student Discipline in Government Schools and Suspension and Expulsion Policy. The key change is the approach all NSW public schools will take to address disruptive or inappropriate behaviour by a student. The duration of a suspension will be reduced along with the number of suspensions across a school year. Every school will be able to draw on the support of a range of staff including behaviour specialists to effectively address issues resulting in these behaviours in order to prevent future escalations. We will continue to work closely with you and all our families.

It does not mean, however, that students who are violent or seriously disrupt the learning and wellbeing of others will be kept at school. Any student who puts the safety of other students, teachers and staff or visitors at risk of harm – will be suspended until it is safe for them to return.

The Inclusive Education Policy for students with disability and the Student Behaviour Policy become operational in Term 4, 2022 and the Restrictive Practices Policy becomes operational in Term 1, 2023.

The staff and I are reviewing our current approach to all of the areas covered by these policies and wish to share any changes we believe need to made with you next term.

Our school already takes a strong, positive student-centred approach, but we want to work with you to ensure, together, every student has the right support at the right time to help them grow into confident, resilient adults.

I would like to send a very big thank you to our P&C who have funded through a kind donation an additional SLSO to work on personal care programs in the school. This is to support our student's independence in personal care, and I am happy to report we are having some great successes with this program. The P&C have also generously donated funds to support the maintenance of our sensory garden and we have a landscaper attending during the holidays to complete this work.

These holidays we continue to upgrade our school. In the top playground we are removing the grass area and covering this area with soft fall making it safer and more accessible for our students. We have gone with the same blue colour that is around the school. As soon as this is complete, we have ordered a new climbing dome for our junior students to use, and this will be installed. Also, in the holidays a new all weather shade cloth is being installed over the self-regulation area, which is a calm area supporting our students when they need time to return to baseline. We also are having our annual roofing and guttering done and a new duress buzzer system installed in all the accessible bathrooms, to support work, health, and safety.

The school has also just invested in a new audio-visual system for the hall and extending the audio system outside under the covered learning area. This will be a great new addition for all our events and should be installed late October.

I wish everyone a great term break and look forward to our students and staff safe return on Monday 10th October 2022.

News from the classroom

Class Ahilleos

Class Ahilleos have done some amazing things in the last few weeks focusing on some new skills during Mathematics, PDHPE, History and English lessons.

In mathematics, our class have been practicing our skills to identify equal groups and practice skip counting by 2s and 5s with hands on activities. As the end of Term 3 comes to an end we would like to wish all our families an enjoyable and relaxing break and we can't wait to see all the boys back for the last term this year.






Class Jopson




