


ZONES OF REGULATION

As you may be aware, students at BGS are getting familiar with the Zones of Regulation program by identifying different emotions and placing themselves in green, red, yellow and blue zones. These zones are each broken down into three familiar feelings that they visualise consistently on the Zones of Regulation meter. For example, to teach students 'Be in green zone', the teacher shows the Zones of Regulation meter and explicitly models deep breathing and calming down gestures of AUSLAN through lessons and incidentally across the school day. The Zones of Regulation approach to self-regulate can be applied in the community, home or all other environments.

Using Zones of Regulation language with your child, they use their previous learnings of emotions and communicate their emotional state, and some of our students will implement strategies, like deep breathing or smiling starfish hand movements, to self-regulate with parents or carers.



I would like to acknowledge three School Learning Support Officers Health (SLSO Health), Deb, Anitha and Thoria who were all successful through an eligibility listing and became permanent members of staff. 

Every morning, we complete our morning meeting program which involves learning the different seasons, months of the year and counting all the way to a hundred and fifty! We then continue with daily activities such as handwriting practice, matching numbers to the correct cue cards, and following our TEACCH schedule to carry out learning tasks independently.

The students participated in the whole school physical education with their peers and worked to develop a range of fundamental movement skills including walking, running, jumping, throwing, and catching with verbal and partial physical prompts. They have also been actively engaged during our weekly swimming program. All the students have been practicing treading water and using a kickboard to assist with their kicking and hand movement. The students followed safety measures while at the pool. They walked around the pool carefully when verbally prompted. They entered and exited the pool using the ramp with verbal and gestural prompts. Each student continues to work on improving their swimming stroke and safety in and around the pool. 


Class Marwaha



Class Naboulsi











NDIS cost: All sessions are \$299, based on a 1:3 ratio. If you require a higher level of support, please contact us for a customised quote. Prices are based on the current NDIS price guide and are subject to change.

Transport cost: Transport will be charged after the outing and will be divided by the number of customers that travel in vehicle.

Bookings: For bookings and amendments please call Customer Service Team: 1800 818 286.

Cancellations: If you need to cancel your place once it has been confirmed, please contact Northcott on 1800 818 286. Please give at least 48 hours notice for any cancellations.

Support worker costs: Support worker costs are included in the total cost and will cover the cost of staff entry into venues and use of public transport. This cost will be invoiced or payable to staff on the day depending on the activity. In the event that there are adequate companion cards this fee will be reduced or waived. For those who are attending with a 1:1 support worker, you will be responsible for the full cost of the support workers entry and transport.


