

# Zones Of Regulation

Zones of Regulation continues to be an effective tool for self and co-regulation for all our students. Self-regulation relates to the ability to control one's emotions and behaviour, get along with others and engage in learning. The Zones of Regulation curriculum uses a cognitive behavioural approach to assist students in building self-regulation skills. It has increased self-awareness and social and emotional awareness among our students. All our students use a consistent program to identify different emotions, sort them into four coloured zones, how they feel, and explore a wide variety of strategies to self-regulate with staff members. This program gives a differentiated support to our students to stay or return to the baseline to be effective learners at BGS.





Thank you, Revesby Workers Club: I would like to personally acknowledge our friends from Revesby Workers Club. They support our school in many ways including allowing us to use their rooms for events such as our Year 12 formal. Recently as you would have read, they generously donated a substantial amount to our school to upgrade the sensory garden area. The sensory garden provides our students a space to engage with and enjoy nature in a safe and tactile environment. Our sensory garden makes a great contribution to their emotional and physical health. It is a beautiful place to relax, reflect and contemplate. The sensory garden will soon have more outdoor musical instruments installed. Research shows that when children play with musical instruments it can be very valuable to their development. Playing with instruments helps build fine and gross motor skills and supports sensory development.

**Personalised Learning Plan (PLP) Meetings:** A very big thank you to our families that took time out to participate in the vital Personalised Learning Plan meetings with your child's teacher. PLP meetings are effective and necessary for several reasons:

- Tailored Education: Every individual has unique strengths and areas of improvement, learning styles and goals. PLP meetings allow educators to customise the learning experiences to match the specific needs of each student. This approach increases engagement and motivation, as students feel their education is relevant and designed to help them succeed.
- **Maximise Potential:** PLPs help students reach their full potential by capitalising on their strengths and addressing areas where improvement is needed. This individualised approach can lead to increased learning and skill development.
- **Learning Pace:** Not all students learn at the same pace. PLPs allow students to progress at a rate that suits them best preventing boredom and frustration caused by being held back or rushed ahead.
- **Diverse Needs:** In inclusive classrooms, students varying abilities and backgrounds and learning styles coexist. PLPs enable educators to accommodate these differences, ensuring that every student receives the support they require.
- **Goal Setting and Monitoring:** PLPs involve setting clear goals and objectives. Regular meetings provides an opportunity to track progress and make necessary adjustments, helping students stay on track.
- **Holistic Development:** PLPs often encompass not only academic goals but also personal, social and emotional development. This well-rounded approach helps students develop important life skills beyond the traditional curriculum.
- Parent-Teacher Collaboration: PLP meetings facilitate effective communication between teachers and parents. This collaborative effort ensures that all parties are aligned in supporting the student's growth and progress.



Bookings: For bookings and amendments please call Customer Service Team: 1800 818 286.


Cancellations: If you need to cancel your place once it has been confirmed, please contact Northcott on 1800 818 286. Please give at least 48 hours notice for any cancellations.






# CHILD PROTECTION WEEK 3-9 September
