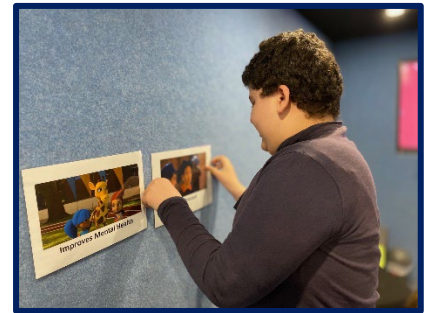


Life Education

Thank you to all who attended and our senior hospitality students for the beautiful lunch prepared and served. Stay tuned for more opportunities to engage and learn together.

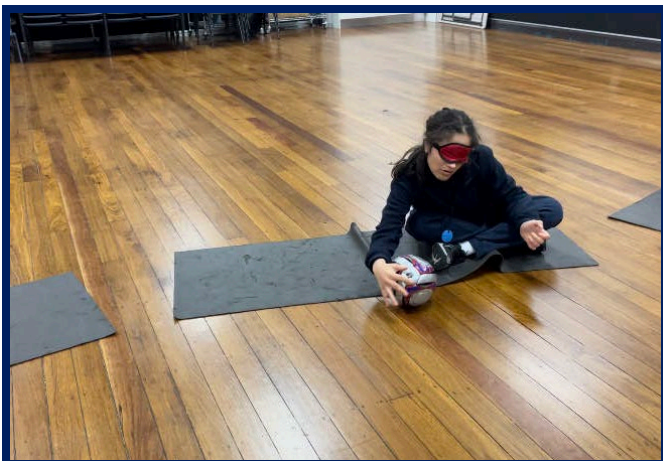

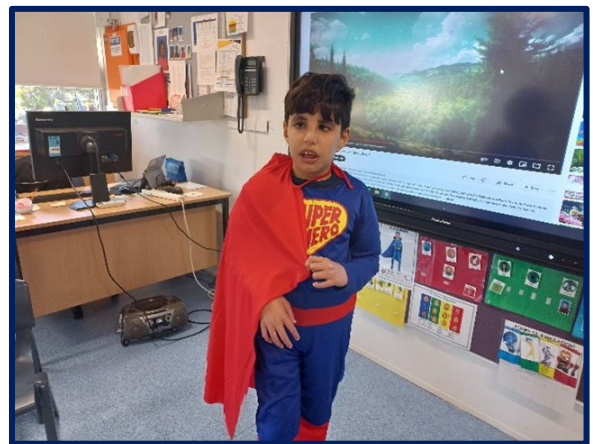

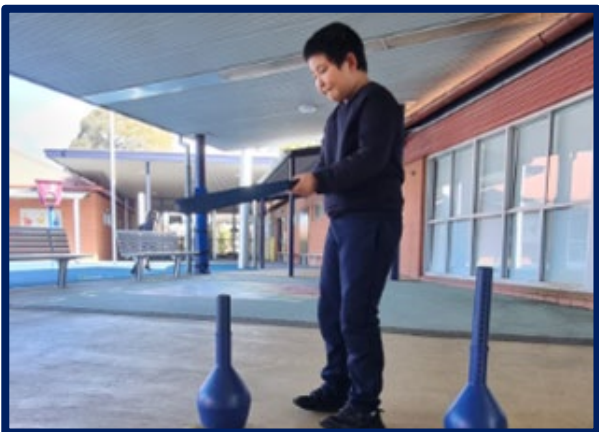

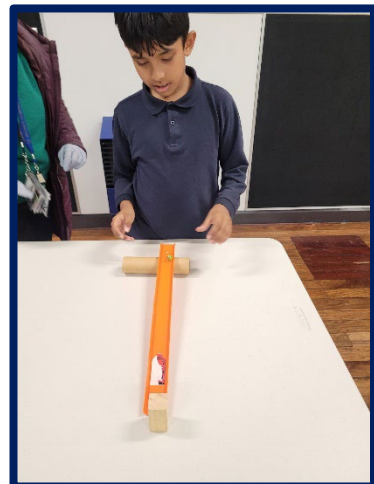

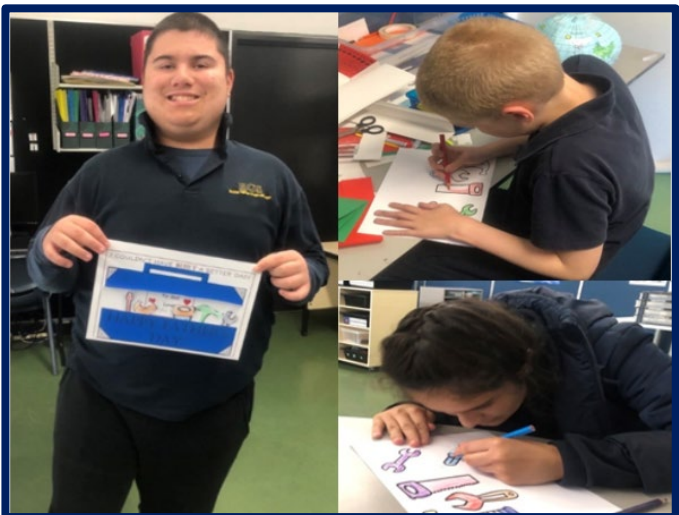

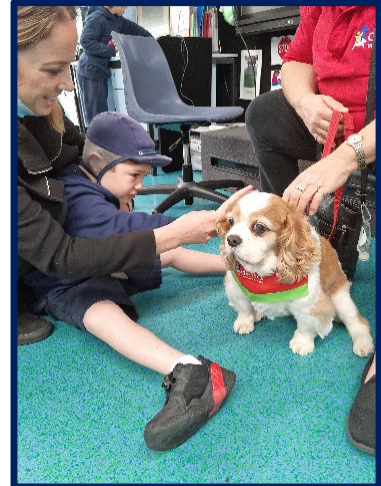
Class Suarez
